ARSENIC CONTAMINATION AT FULFORD X

The possibility of the presence of arsenic in significant quantities on Fulford Cross allotments made headline news recently. In fact, the chemical traces were not found on the actual allotments, but on the adjacent school land, where local people remember quantities of hospital waste being dumped some decades ago. Tests continue to see whether any of the poison has reached the allotments, but as Tom Robinson, Site Secretary of Fulford Cross pointed out, the proof may be in the eating: "I've been taking veg from my plot for 40 years and it hasn't done me any harm." In any case, Low Moor, with its 1,000-year history of arable agriculture is completely immune from all possibility of contamination. So get back to work!

VANDALISM AND THEFT AT LOW MOOR

Unfortunately, Low Moor has been through a series of bad spells of vandalism and theft this year, including two arson attacks, thefts of tools and other potential boot-sale stock, and perhaps worst of all, repeated thefts of vegetables, which has been very rare in the past. As ever, there is only a limited amount that can be done. If you see a crime taking place, call the Police on 999 and Mayfair Security on 0800 783 7537. If you have a mobile phone, please take a moment to put Mayfair's number into the memory. And please keep reporting any crime or vandalism to the Police on 0845 60 60 24 7 with as many details as possible. We may not have seen many improvements, but the Police are at least aware now that allotment crime is a serious issue.

PROGRESS ON FOOTPATH DIVERSION

Our proposal to divert the public footpath and cycle way that runs through the site has temporarily stalled. At a meeting on site with representatives of the Police, the Council and the University, Al argued that the scheme was too expensive and complex for an Allotments association to handle and that it should be taken forward by the Council, with funding from central coffers and perhaps from Sustrans, the Cycle network. This was agreed to, but mysteriously, the Minutes of the meeting did not reflect that! If anyone wants to help push this project forward again, please get in touch with Al. Meanwhile, the perimeter hedge is growing nicely.

HEDGES AND BRAMBLES - ACT NOW!

YOU, yes you, are responsible for looking after the boundaries of your plot, outside as well as inside! Hedges and brambles which encroach into paths give the grass mowers an excuse for not doing the job properly and hedges over 1.5m (5 feet) high reduce the security of the site as a whole. Autumn is the time to cut hedges back and reduce their height where necessary to improve visibility across the site. It's almost time to prune back brambles to the main stems and tie these onto your fence, which will encourage them to produce more fruit next year. Eddy's plot, next to the car park, is always a good example of exactly what to do. Because much of Low Moor has been derelict in the past, the Council has been fairly tolerant of overgrown hedges till now, but all that will end this Autumn! If your boundary does not meet the requirements of the tenancy agreement by next Spring, this will treated as grounds for eviction.

PROGRESS ON SHOP REBUILD

We have sorted out the tricky issue of our tenancy of the car park and a new design has been produced, which is intended to be more secure, without losing any of the eco-friendly features. It is about to be submitted to the Council for Planning Permission. We are still trying to raise additional funds, but Frank is convinced we have enough to afford it already, with the help of some volunteer labour in due course.
