Dear Allotmenteers

It is now 4 years since I chaired the first meeting of Low Moor Allotments Association. In that time much has changed, not least on my own plot, which has become much more weedy! Since the formation of the Association, much has changed:

- we have gone from less than 50% tenancy to a long waiting list
- we have raised over £20,000 to improve the condition of the site
- many abandoned sites have been reclaimed, including the former tip, which has become the popular *petanque* (French boules) pitch
- we have revived the Shop to become a thriving resource
- we have established the award-winning Community Kid's Plot
- we have a website that attracts praise from other Allotment Association across the UK and even internationally

Security was a burning issue (literally) when we started the Association. Sadly, though things have improved, security remains our greatest challenge. Part of the intention in forming the Association was to improve security for everyone by creating a sense of community, which would in turn encourage us all to look after our neighbours.
